My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand. **John 10:27-28**

As you are aware, October is an important month for Lutherans, as it was on October 31st, 1517, that Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses on the door of the Wittenberg church. It is also vital to recognize the faithful theologians who came before Luther to understand his thought and how he gained such a rich understanding of Holy Scripture.

And so, we turn our attention to one of those brilliant theologians: Ignatius of Antioch. He was an early Church Father whose life, writings, and martyrdom continue to inspire Christians across the centuries. Though Ignatius lived long before the Reformation, his steadfast faith and devotion to the Gospel offer profound lessons for us as Christians today.

Who Was Ignatius of Antioch?

Who was known as "Theophorus" (meaning "God-bearer"), was born around 35 AD and became the Bishop of Antioch, a city that played a crucial role in early Christianity. Tradition holds that he was a disciple of the Apostle John, placing him at the heart of the first generation of Christian leaders after the apostles.

Around 107 AD, during a time of persecution under Roman rule, Ignatius was arrested for his faith in Christ and sent to Rome to face execution. On his journey, he wrote a series of letters to early Christian communities, which remain valuable resources for understanding the beliefs and practices of the early Church.

Ignatius' Contributions to the Christian Faith

Christ-Centered Life and Martyrdom: One of the central themes of Ignatius' life was his unwavering commitment to Jesus Christ, even to the point of death. His letters reveal a deep desire to imitate Christ, particularly in suffering. One of the most important teachings in the church is the "theology of the cross." We hold fast to the idea of taking up our crosses and following Christ (Matthew 16:24), knowing that suffering comes before glory. Ignatius' martyrdom reminds us that true discipleship often involves sacrifice and perseverance in the face of trials.

Unity in the Church: Ignatius emphasized the importance of unity within the Christian community, especially through the leadership of bishops. The unity of the Church is found not in a human institution but in steadfast faith in the Word of God and the proper administration of the sacraments. Ignatius' emphasis on unity aligns with our desire for the Church to be united by the truth of the Gospel.

The Real Presence of Christ: In his letters, Ignatius spoke of the Eucharist as "the medicine of immortality," a tangible way in which believers partake in Christ's body and blood. His writings affirm the real presence of Christ in the Lord's Supper. In his letter to the church in Smyrna (modern-day Turkey), Ignatius warns against those who deny that the Eucharist is "the flesh of our Savior Jesus Christ." This resonates with Luther's teachings on the sacrament, where we confess Christ's true body and blood "in, with, and under" the bread and wine for the forgiveness of sins.

Faith in Christ Alone: Though Ignatius did not use the Reformation language of *sola fide* (faith alone), his writings continually point to Christ as the sole source of salvation. In his letter to the Ephesians, he refers to "our Lord, Jesus Christ, who is our hope" (Ephesians 1:1). His understanding—and ours—is that salvation is found through faith in Christ alone, apart from works.

Ignatius' letters give us a glimpse into the early Christian Church, revealing timeless truths that still shape our faith today. His courageous witness in the face of martyrdom reminds us of the strength that comes from trusting in Christ. His emphasis on the Eucharist, Christian unity, and the centrality of Christ in all things provides valuable lessons for living out our faith.

While the circumstances of our lives may be far removed from those of Ignatius, his passion for the Gospel and his willingness to stand firm in his faith—even unto death—remain relevant. As Christians, we are called to the same bold proclamation of Christ and to embrace the means of grace He has given us through Word and Sacrament.

O Lord, grant us the courage and faith of your servant Ignatius, who stood firm in the face of persecution and death, bearing witness to the truth of Your Son, Jesus Christ. Strengthen us to live boldly in faith, united in the truth of Your Word, and nourished by the body and blood of Christ in the Eucharist. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Christian Stewardship

"The Singing Church"



Lutherans have historically been called "the singing church." There is no doubt that music has been a major component in the theology and practice of the Lutheran church. Luther once remarked about music, "We can mention only one point, namely, that next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise." Music has a power and purpose that cannot be understated in our worship and the life of the congregation. But music does more than touch the emotions. Music is a vehicle that carries both the musician and the hearer deeper into connection with the truth of the Scriptures. This is true of the most complex Bach chorale and even the simplest of songs like "Jesus Loves Me, This I Know." Each musical selection within the church shapes the thoughts, minds and faith of the people who experience them.

This is also true of stewardship hymns. We are currently considering the verses of "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (*LSB* 788) as it shapes our understanding and practice of stewardship. This month we take a deeper dive into verse two:

Teach us to thank you, Lord, for love and grace For life and vision, for a purpose clear, For Christ Your Son, and for each human face that shows Your message ever new and near.

The stanza begins by touching on the truth of the Law. Thankfulness is not a natural posture for fallen humanity. For sinners curved in upon themselves, thankfulness for love and grace is something that must be taught. We are those who hoard and clutch. Our confession of our shallow thankfulness highlights the need for us to learn thankfulness to God.

Thankfulness also points to what we are stewards of: love and grace! All the things we have traditionally called stewardship aren't actual stewardship. Rather, what matters is how we steward the one, true and only treasure: the love and grace of God revealed to us in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. So, all stewardship is stewardship of the Gospel! How can we gaze at the cross and empty tomb and not be thankful?

The LCMS defines stewardship as "the free and joyous activity of God's family — the church — in managing life's resources for His purposes." God's love and mercy give us a clear purpose as we live out our Baptism and practice this joyous stewardship. All we are, all we have entrusted to us, and all we are called to do is to connect others with the love and mercy of God revealed in Jesus!

The faithful steward sings with lips and life of this love and mercy that is ever new and near. In the Scriptures. In the Lord's House. At the Lord's Table. This is where our stewardship song starts and ends. Our family, our co-workers and classmates, and our world need to hear this song!
