Dear Sheep of the Divine Shepherd:

As we approach the joyous season of Christmas, I would like to reflect on the deep spiritual and historical significance of Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. For Christians around the world, these days mark not just the commemoration of Christ's birth, but also an opportunity to gather in the Divine Service, celebrating the fulfillment of God's promises, and also to examine the rich traditions that have shaped our faith.

Christmas Eve: A Time for Waiting and Anticipation

For Christians, Christmas Eve is more than just the day before Christmas—it is a time for anticipation and quiet reflection. Christmas Eve is the night when we gather for our candlelight service of Lessons and Carols, which bring to us hope, peace, and the promise of our coming Savior.

In the liturgy, the service we will once again sing hymns such as "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming," invoking the centuries of longing for the promised Messiah. The reading of the Nativity story from the Gospel of Luke (Luke 2:1–20) is central, as it recounts the miraculous birth of Jesus in a humble stable in Bethlehem. The night is illuminated by the soft glow of candles, symbolizing the light of Christ coming into the world to dispel the darkness of sin.

Christians observe this night with solemn joy, remembering that Christ, the promised Savior, came to save His people from their sins. As the organ plays and the congregation and choir sings, we are reminded that the birth of Jesus is a fulfillment of God's plan for humanity, a moment when heaven and earth meet in the person of Jesus Christ.

Christmas Day: A Day of Rejoicing and Celebration

Christmas Day, the day we celebrate the birth of Jesus, is the beginning of 12 days where the Church focuses on the blessed babe who also is Lord over heaven and earth. We remember that the birth of Christ is not just a historical event but the very heart of our faith. The incarnation—the belief that God became flesh in the person of Jesus—reminds us that God is intimately involved in the world He created. It is a day of great rejoicing, for as the angels declared to the shepherds, "I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people" (Luke 2:10).

Christmas Day is a time to gather together to confess our faith and partake of the Lord's Supper, receiving the body and blood of Christ which gives to us the forgiveness of our sins and the strengthening of our faith. The church's festive services are filled with hymns of praise, such as "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" and "Joy to the World," as we join the heavenly hosts and all the company of heaven in giving glory to God.

Christmas is also a time for family gatherings, acts of charity, and the sharing of gifts. As we exchange gifts with loved ones, we are reminded of the ultimate gift God gave us in His Son. In this spirit, we emphasize that Christmas is not only a time of personal joy but also a time to remember and care for others, reflecting God's love and mercy.

The Historical Development of Christmas Traditions The Origins of Christmas

The history of Christmas is rich and multifaceted, with its roots in both Christian and pre-Christian traditions. While the exact date of Jesus' birth is not known, early Christians in the 4th century chose December 25 as the official date for the celebration of Christ's nativity. This date was likely selected to coincide with the Roman festival of Sol Invictus (the "Unconquered Sun"), which celebrated the return of the sun after the winter solstice. By choosing this time of year, early Christians symbolically linked the birth of Christ—the "Light of the World"—with the return of the physical light of the sun. In the Middle Ages, the celebration of Christmas evolved with a blend of local customs, religious observances, and festive practices. The tradition of the Christmas tree, for example, has roots in Germanic pagan customs, but it was adapted and Christianized in the 16th century by figures such as Martin Luther. Legend holds that Luther, inspired by the beauty of stars shining through the branches of trees, was the first to decorate a tree with candles to symbolize the light of Christ.

Other Christmas traditions, such as the singing of carols, the giving of gifts, and the Christmas feast, have also developed over time, shaped by both religious observance and cultural influences.

The Influence of Martin Luther and the Reformation

In the 16th century, Martin Luther had a profound impact on the way Christmas was celebrated in the Lutheran tradition. Luther emphasized the importance of the incarnation and the need for personal faith in Christ. He also encouraged the use of hymns as a means of worship, leading to the creation of some of the earliest Lutheran Christmas carols, such as "From Heaven Above to Earth I Come."

Luther was also instrumental in making the Christmas season more accessible to the people. He advocated for the use of the vernacular in church services, ensuring that ordinary people could participate in the worship and celebrations. In Lutheran and Reformation traditions, Christmas was not just a time for the clergy to offer ritual, but for all Christians to actively engage in the joy and hope of the season.

Christ's Birth—A Gift for All

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, let us remember that the birth of Jesus is not just a historical event but the beginning of God's incredible work of salvation. In Christ, God came to us as one of us, bringing peace, hope, and reconciliation. The Christmas story is a story of divine love: God's love for the world, His love for you, and His invitation for all people to find peace and joy in the Savior's birth.

This Christmas season, in solemn worship and festive gatherings, let us celebrate with hearts full of gratitude for the gift of God's Son. As we remember His birth, let us also look forward in hope to His promised return, when He will make all things new.

Wishing you a blessed Christmas Eve and a joyful Christmas Season, filled with the peace and light of Christ.



Repenting of "Yours" and "Mine"

Retailers have had their Christmas displays up since before Reformation Sunday. The kids have made their list and checked it twice, or three times or more. It won't be long before the tree will start shedding its needles, the stockings emptied, the gifts



But for the children of God, we know that the gift of Christmas doesn't ever end. Week in and week out, the Lord continues to shower His gifts on us. Every time the Lord gathers us to His house, and we are led to kneel at His table, the gift of forgiveness is repeatedly granted to us. It is nothing we deserve. It comes to us freely!

The fourth stanza of the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us Lord for Shallow Thankfulness" (*LSB* 788) highlights both this gift and our response.

Teach us, O Lord, true thankfulness divine, that gives as Christ gave, never counting cost

To learn thankfulness is necessary. The parents of young children are well-versed in the fact that they must teach their children thankfulness. It does not come naturally. The spiritual genetics inherited from our parents allow us to think that the world revolves around us. When we receive something, there is an inward desire to think that we in some way deserve it.

But there is no way that we deserve anything we get from our Lord. We need that ongoing lesson from God Himself. Thankfulness toward God is worked in us by the Holy Spirit. God's Word works this thanksgiving in us. We need this weekly reminder that Jesus didn't consider "equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself" for us, to the point of death on a cross (Phil. 2:6). He didn't bat an eye. He paid the price! Our life of stewardship is one of daily and weekly thanksgiving inspired by the Lord Himself.

That knows no barrier of "yours" and "mine," assured that only what's withheld is lost.

Because Jesus gave us everything and more, there can be no ownership. The child at Christmas is quick to claim that the newly gifted toy is "mine!" But as Psalm 24:1 asserts, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein." There isn't anything in creation that is ours. When we cling to and claim ownership of anything in creation, we are losing out on the continual gifts with which the Lord desires to shower upon us. Closed hands cannot receive anything new. We cling to the old and dead and miss the new thing that the Lord desires to do in and for us.

We are led to repent of the "yours" and "mine" and remove the lie that we have any ownership. In this we have the promise that God will continue to give to us. Not just at Christmas, but every Sunday at the altar in the Lord's house.
