Dear Sheep of the Divine Shepherd:

In the rich tapestry of Christian history, certain figures stand out as pillars of unwavering faith and defenders of orthodox doctrine. Among them is Athanasius of Alexandria, a theologian and church father whose contributions continue to resonate within the Christian tradition. It is Athanasius that the church commemorates on May 2nd.

Athanasius was born around 296 AD in Alexandria, Egypt, a center of Christian learning and theological debate. From an early age, he displayed a keen intellect and a deep commitment to the Christian faith. Under the tutelage of influential Christian scholars, Athanasius received a comprehensive education that would shape his theological convictions and his ecclesiastical career.

Ascending through the ranks of the Church, Athanasius quickly became known for his intellectual prowess and theological acumen. In 328 AD, he accompanied his bishop, Alexander of Alexandria, to the First Council of Nicaea, where he played a pivotal role in articulating the orthodox Christian position regarding the nature of Jesus Christ.

Throughout his life, Athanasius faced numerous challenges and hardships due to his steadfast stance against Arianism. He was exiled from Alexandria multiple times by Arian-leaning emperors who sought to suppress his influence. Despite these persecutions, Athanasius remained resolute in his convictions, continuing to advocate for Nicene orthodoxy.

Athanasius' literary contributions are vast and profound, with his most famous work being "On the Incarnation." In this treatise, he expounds upon the significance of Christ's divine incarnation and its implications for salvation, laying a foundation for Christian thought that endures to this day.

The legacy of Athanasius extends beyond his own time, earning him the title "Father of Orthodoxy" within the Christian tradition. His tireless efforts to defend Nicene orthodoxy have left an indelible mark on the development of Christian theology, particularly in the areas of Christology and Trinitarian doctrine.

Saint Athanasius, died on May 2, 373 AD. His life's work and contributions to Christian theology continue to be celebrated and studied by scholars and believers alike.

As we reflect on the life and legacy of Athanasius of Alexandria, let us honor his unwavering commitment to defending the faith once delivered to the saints. May his example inspire us to stand firm in our own convictions, grounded in the timeless truths of the Christian gospel.

Christian Stewardship

More Than a Negative



Even if you've never had to testify in court, a thousand TV shows have made you familiar with the question, "Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?" Why not just make people swear to tell the truth? Or make them promise not to lie?

Any parent who has ever had to interrogate a child about a broken cookie jar or a scuffle over a toy knows the answer. There are plenty of ways to try to get out of trouble without *technically* lying. You tell *just enough* of the truth to skate on by.

We often play the game of seeing how close we can get to sinning without technically going over the line.

But in our heart of hearts we know that this is not what God intended when He gave us the commandments. He's not giving us a merely negative rule and challenging us to just barely stay away from this or that. There is much more to each commandment than a prohibition. We shouldn't just avoid murdering people — we should be of service to our neighbor.

For each negative prohibition in the commandments there is a positive good that we are to cherish and protect. In the Eighth Commandment, that gift is the reputation of our neighbor and our relationship with him:

You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

Your relationship with your family members (who are your nearest neighbors), the other members of your congregation, your coworkers and your friends is one of the most precious gifts you have been given. You need to exercise good stewardship with this gift just as much as you need to exercise good stewardship with your life, resources, time and income. This is an especially fragile gift because it's easy to ruin a relationship with slander and talking behind someone's back.

But speaking well of your neighbor in Christian love is absolutely free; it costs you nothing, yet it pays you great dividends. If you find this challenging at times, if you are tempted to speak ill of others, just remember that this other person is also a beloved child of God for whom your Lord Jesus suffered and died. Your Lord Jesus loves you both.
