Dear Sheep of the Divine Shepherd:

As we reflect on the rich tapestry of Reformation history, we turn our attention to a figure whose life and legacy continue to inspire: Pastor Robert Barnes. Born in 1495 in England, Barnes emerged as a pivotal figure in the early English Reformation, advocating passionately for ecclesiastical reform and doctrinal purity. It is Pastor Barnes that the Lutheran Church commemorates on July 30th.

Robert Barnes received his early education at the University of Cambridge, where he joined the Augustinian Friars. His time in Cambridge marked the beginning of a journey that would see him deeply involved in the theological debates of his time. Rising quickly through the ranks, he became the prior of the Augustinian house in Cambridge, wielding significant influence within the religious community.

The turning point in Barnes' life came in 1525, when he visited the University of Wittenberg. There, he met Martin Luther and Philip Melanchthon. This encounter had a profound effect on Barnes, solidifying his commitment to the burgeoning Reformation movement. He returned to England with a newfound zeal to spread Reformation ideas. Barnes' advocacy for Reformation principles soon brought him into conflict with the ecclesiastical authorities. In 1526, his sermon at St. Edward's Church in Cambridge, which sharply criticized the Catholic Church's practices, led to his arrest and imprisonment.

After his release, Barnes continued to support the Reformation cause covertly, but mounting pressure forced him to flee to Germany in 1528. There, he found refuge among the Lutheran reformers and wrote several theological works that further articulated his Reformation convictions.

In 1531, Barnes returned to England and became an influential figure in the English Reformation, promoting Lutheran doctrines and advocating for significant ecclesiastical reforms. The political and religious landscape in England, however, remained tumultuous. In 1540, amidst shifting allegiances and policies, Barnes was arrested once more. This time, he was condemned to death for his Protestant beliefs. On July 30, 1540, Robert Barnes was burned at the stake, becoming one of the early English martyrs of the Reformation.

Pastor Robert Barnes is remembered for his unwavering commitment to Reformation principles and his courageous stand against religious corruption. His writings and sermons significantly contributed to the spread of Lutheran ideas in England, and his martyrdom underscored the profound struggles faced by those who sought to reform the church.

Barnes' legacy endures as a testament to the power of conviction and the enduring impact of the Reformation movement. His life and work continue to inspire those who seek to uphold the principles of faith, reform, and religious integrity.

As we remember Pastor Robert Barnes, let us draw inspiration from his example and remain steadfast in our adherence to the Holy Scriptures and the Confessions of our Church.

Christian Stewardship

The Rewards of Godliness



It's no secret that you can't bribe your way into heaven. No amount of good works will impress God enough to open heaven's door for their sake. "For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23) and the person who "keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it" (James 2:10). Rather, salvation is "the free gift of God ... in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:23).

So, your good works won't earn you the reward of heaven. But does that mean that there are no rewards at all? Consider what the Small Catechism says in the "Close of the Commandments":

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Ex. 20:5–6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands. (SC II)

God promises to bless you in keeping His commandments. What might these blessings be? Well, consider what Paul says about keeping the Fourth Commandment: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 'Honor your father and mother' (this is the first commandment with a promise), 'that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land'" (Eph. 6:1–3).

And think about what your life would be like if you went around stealing (breaking the Seventh Commandment), telling lies about people (breaking the Eighth Commandment), and generally being cruel to those around you (breaking all the commandments!). That is obviously not a blessed way to live. In fact, you'd be miserable living that way.

And Jesus says more about what is in store for those who make sacrifices for His sake: "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of Man will sit on His glorious throne, you who have followed Me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for My name's sake, will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life. (Matt. 19:28–29).

So don't grow impatient in doing good. Follow the Lord who has freely given you everlasting life.
